

Interdisciplinary Minor in **ETHNIC STUDIES**

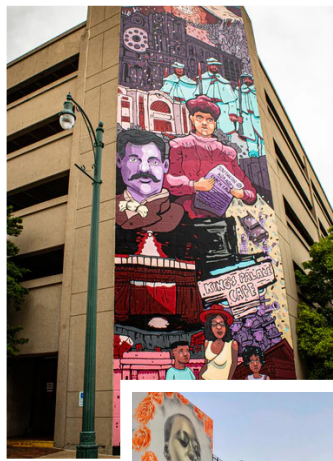
Students will understand the ways in which race and racism have been and continue to be powerful social, cultural, and political forces, connecting these to other axes of stratification, including gender, class, sexuality, and legal status.

The curriculum takes a theoretical, historical, and experiential approach to examine: modern (in)justice, social movements, legal and public policy activism, antiracist and anti-patriarchal ontologies, liberationist epistemologies, and community and identity formation in American history. Students will learn about multiple cultures' social and historical context within the United States; academic and experiential learning are interwoven such that key themes, concepts, and ideas in the field of Ethnic Studies are applied intentionally with communities.
